


Finding Edith: The Book

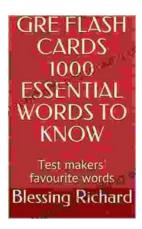
