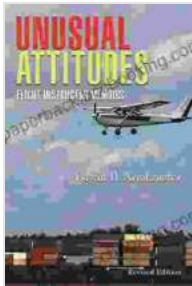

Teaching is one of the most rewarding things you can do. It's a chance to share your knowledge and experience with others. And it's a chance to make a difference in someone's life.

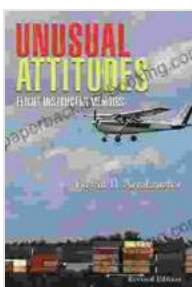

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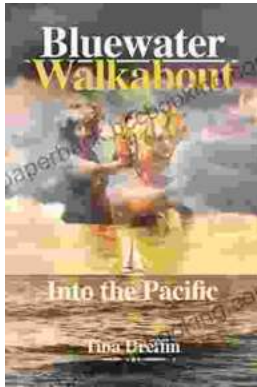
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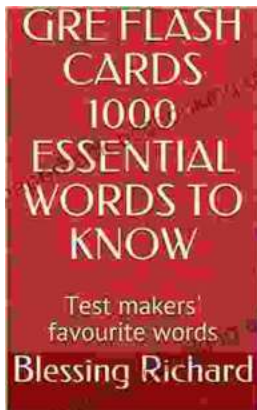
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
